## Video contest offers SR students an opportunity

Slippery Rock students who are aspiring toward a career in the medium of video have been invited to enter into the Second Annual Student Video Competition sponsored by US JVC Corp. This corporation is a leading manufacturer of professional and home video equipment and began this competition last year.
