According to the Commonwealth Association of Stu-dents, students attending Slippery Rock State College may be exempt from the local per capita tax. Tax statements have been sent to a number of students with certain sections, particularly Acts 511 and 679, of the Pennsylvania tax code. However, these same laws also provide for

There are different rules for each of these taxes. In general, however, if a person is a full-time student and earns less then \$3,200.00 a year, they are eligible for an exemption.

To qualify for an exemption, a student must file a form known as a Request for Exoneration of Per Capita Tax with the appropriate tax authority. Once this is done, the tax liability will be abated
