

I.F.C. elects new officers

Also serving the council

in the Intermural/Scholarship position is Scott Clark from Alpha Sigma Phi.

The newly elected officers have already outlined some goals which they feel can be accomplished within the next year or two. According to President Jerry Hallwell the board plans to strengthen the alcohol awareness program that was started but never successfully completed by the last executive board. "Liability will be a key discussion issue between the executive board and the chapters," said Executive Vice President Andrew Tenney. "We

want to make sure the fraternities realize their responsibilities for drinkers at the parties, especially for those under age."

The new executive members are also to help individual chapters set up scholarships programs and focus more attention on chapter QPA's. "If the chapter's grade average is below a reasonable level, the board will make recommendations for inclusion of study hours," said Hallman.

The council also plans to increase interest among non-greeks and raise the greek pop-

ulation to 16-17 percent. "We want more unity among greeks," said Hallman. To do this, they are attempting to create a system of greek housing where only greeks would live at Keister apartments. "Someone has to get the ball rolling. It's only being talked about at this point, but no one has put the idea down so far," said Hallman.

"All greeks need a place to be together, like at other big universities," added Tenney.

Other plans by the executive board include conducting a survey to find the image of greek organizations among non-greeks.

As far as working to help get the TKE fraternity recognition back, Hallman stated, "We want them to be recognized again, but to do so they have to lay low, at the same time work towards improvement of academic and social standards that are required by the administration and the Interfraternal Council."

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Free placement for seniors

The Career Development and Placement Office extends free services to seniors who are facing the job hunt.

Assistant Director Nancy Robb said the Placement Office will aid seniors in each step of the job search process. Students can attend the various workshops offered such as interviewing skills, resume writing, job search techniques, and summer employment, or can receive individualized help as they work through three steps.

Step one involves learning to write a cover letter and resume that will sell the student.

Step two puts together a credential file consisting of a biographic summary, a letter of reference and transcripts released with no extra cost. The file will not be removed, and in case of a later job switch will be sent to the prospective employer.

Step three is a video taped mock interview and feedback session. The student may go through the mock interview as many times as desired.

Campus recruitment is the last step. Robb said students beat expenses of going to the company by the company coming to the student. Seniors can interview with personnel specialists representing business and industry.

Also, in preparing for that big interview, facts about major corporations are on file, plus free magazines containing detailed information on companies available for student use. Job locations, job vacancies, and internship information are available. Working through the Do-It-Yourself Career Lab might aid students in finding a specific area in their major. Robb advised that the job search should begin as soon as possible.

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Agnes of God cast chosen

Three Slippery Rock students will perform in the next University Theatre production, Agnes of God.

Tamara Al-Kasey, a 21 year old senior, and resident of Slippery Rock will play the part of Dr. Martha Livingstone, a psychologist. She is assigned to find out whether Agnes is insane, or if she knowingly murdered her baby.

Joanna Gerdy, a 20 year old junior, will play the part of Mother Superior Miriam Ruth, who runs the convent. She is opposed to the psychologist from the beginning and believes that the baby was born of an immaculate conception. Gerdy, a native of Greenville, will be performing in her first theatre production.

Miranda Turner, a 19 year old sophomore, will play the part of Sister Agnes who is charged with the murder of the

baby. Agnes is naive and oblivious to all that is going on around her.

"It is easy to tell early in the play that Agnes becomes very attached to 'Dr. Livingstone,'" said Carol Ohle, P.R. chairperson for Miller Auditorium. "This will also be Turner's first theatre appearance, one in which she will be required to do a lot of live on-stage singing," added Ohle. Ohle went on to say that Agnes was cast as a young white nun in the film and that Turner is black. Most people will be forced to look more at the meaning and the content of the play due to this, said Ohle.

The production will begin at 8 p.m. on Feb. 26, 27, 28, and March 1, in an arena style performance. The Miller Auditorium box office will be open from 11 a.m.-4:30 p.m. each day. Student tickets are 50¢, and non-student tickets are \$3.
